### **2025 Festival of Brass Review**

There is definitely something special about a Christchurch contest. The Town Hall complex provides everything required in a contest venue: two great theatres, plenty of rooms for solos and warm-up areas, a large foyer for socialising and browsing trade stands, and plenty of accommodation, restaurants, and bars, all within a short walk. With the venues and location taken care of, it was over to the 37 bands from New Zealand and Australia to make the event a memorable one.

The solo and ensemble events on the first two days of the competition showcased the calibre of trans-Tasman talent. The beautiful performances at the Invitation Slow Melody on the first night set an extremely high standard. Congratulations to David Maas, Levin and District Brass, who won the title for the fourth time. The evening included performances by Kay MacKenzie, Lachlan Spence, and Brad Mancer of the winning compositions from the SOUNZ slow melody competition. For the first time, the event was recorded for broadcast by Radio NZ, which also recorded the Champion of Champions and A Grade band events.

Congratulations to 17-year-old Kilian Casey from Auckland City Brass on winning the Junior Champion of Champions at his first National Contest. The Open Championship of Champions was a truly Australasian event with Nicky Abkiewicz, Adam Arnold (playing twice) and James Blackford representing Australia, plus the 2025 Australia Cornet Champion, Raynor Martin from Woolston Brass. However, the title went to 17-year-old Keina Rollinson from Woolston Brass with a near note-perfect performance on marimba.

The band events were as competitive and intense as ever, and Chief Adjudicator Frédéric Théodoloz, the 2024 4barsrest Conductor of the Year, was impressed with the standard of playing in the A Grade. Wellington Brass, directed by David Bremner, wrote its name in our history books again by winning its seventh championship title in a row and its tenth in 11 years. Woolston Brass (Phillip Johnston) with a win in the Sacred Item placed second overall, with North Shore Brass (Harmen Vanhoorne) in third place. The Australian bands provided fierce competition with Brass Band Newcastle (Conrad Curry) placing second in the Own Choice and fourth overall, and Darebin City Brass (Andrew Snell), third in the Sacred Item and fifth overall.

The B Grade contest was a story of the regeneration of St Kilda Brass under the baton of Emeritus Professor Peter Adams. The band was thrilled with their win in the grade and gave credit to the young players who now populate the band, including Harry Parker, who was awarded the Best Principal

Cornet trophy.

Second place went to Eastern Bay of Plenty Brass (Andrew Leech), and third place to Windsor Excelsior Band from Brisbane (Dale Hoskings). Making a good showing was Woolston Concert Brass in their first appearance in the B Grade, placing third in the Sacred Item and Test piece and fourth overall

Adjudicator Nick Johnson enjoyed the performances in the C Grade as well as the witty remarks by compere Paul van Uden. Levin and Districts Brass (David Maas) took home the C Grade Championship title for the first time in 16 years with a win in the Own Choice and second placings in the Test piece and Sacred Item. Rolleston Brass (Raynor Martin) continued their good form, placing second at consecutive contests with newly promoted Rangiora RSA Club Band (Dwayne Bloomfield) a close third.

A special mention to the 90-strong party from the Whitehorse Brass and Box Hill Academy Brass. Their maroon jackets could be seen throughout the contest as they supported their many soloists and celebrated a win by Box Hill Academy (Lauren Innes) in the Youth Grade and a fourth placing for White Horse Brass in the C Grade (Broden Ford).

It was a four-point victory in the D Grade

for New Brighton Silver Band and its young conductor, Lachlan Grant, with two wins and a second placing giving the band its first-ever national title. Second place went to Mosgiel Brass (Philip Cragie QSM) and third to Addington Workshop Band (Matthew Harris) at its first national contest.

For the first time in twenty-nine years, a national contest concluded with a marching event. The Parade of Bands on Sunday morning drew a large, supportive crowd to cheer on 30 bands. Many bands demonstrated innovation in their music choices and interesting manoeuvres around the change of direction or in front of the dais. Congratulations to the winning bands and to all bands that embraced the change in the contest schedule. This change certainly allowed the Friday of the contest to run smoothly and less stressfully.

## Apokalypsis – a review

5 July 2025

We're all at risk of taking Wellington Brass for granted. Its excellence has been sustained for well over a decade now. But musical director David Bremner may have taken an even bigger risk recently, putting his faith in a rising Wellington composer. Let's pause to recognise just how bold and remarkable it was for the band to seek yet another national championship by choosing to perform the brand new work, *Apokalypsis*.

Young composer Jack Bewley has been making a name for himself locally for a while. Yet this was a mighty effort, larger than anything he had attempted before. Those of us lucky enough to be in the Christchurch Town Hall on 5 July will not quickly forget those 23 minutes of wonder.

The programme notes for *Apokalypsis* invite listeners to consider the end of the world from a range of historical and religious perspectives. This theme of final days implies we're about to experience something ambitious. Perhaps we will imagine a revelatory or visionary judgement day, in a spiritual sense. Or instead, something more profanely catastrophic. Do we see heaven or do we see a meteorite? That might depend on you. I hear some moments of beauty and lamentation, and others that invoke dread. There are times here when I recall the impending doom of Lars von Trier's film

*Melancholia*, which I loved but found so terrifying I'll probably never watch it again.

The work has two slow and two quick movements. It opens with an extended mournful cry from an offstage Brad Mancer on flugel horn, with a theme built on an uneasy minor seventh interval. The solos feel like they were written precisely for the individuals playing them, as they probably were. No fewer than eight principals enjoy long moments alone, which they grasp like they personally own them.

Nic Scott's burst of dynamism on tuba is so frenetic I initially mistake it for a euphonium. The best solos are the elegiac cadenzas that begin with a sustained note growing subtly out of the gentle hum of the accompaniment, such as Luke Giri-Spence, who has such confidence and control in his pianissimo that he stands and turns his euphonium bell away from the auditorium, encouraging Kyle Lawson on cornet to join him. The audience holds its breath. And then, as if from the ground, emerge delicate voices in song. Just for a moment, in soft focus, and then I am left wondering what that was and where it went.

The louder movements showcase Wellington Brass's typical restraint. David Bremner, as always, controls his band's smooth, mellow sound with warmth and balance, avoiding anything harsh or flashy. The six basses and three euphoniums create a sense of

vastness without ever having to blast. Matt Stein on soprano offers a layer of clarity, not brashness. The percussionists, who in most bands tend to draw the eye, know how to contribute without appearing to show off.

Our audience can feel the end looming. Or maybe The End. The chord progressions become tense, ominous, and unnerving. Something scary is approaching, and we're not sure it's good. The basses dig a hole towards the centre of the earth in powerful motions, while rows of standing cornets alternate in hurling arrows from either side of the stage. Wilby's Revelation is definitely present, and I somehow hallucinate an echo of Shostakovich's devastating Leningrad symphony. The massive last chord eventually resolves, so as to offer a blessed release. There's no doubting it's the sound of finality. I'm not convinced it's a note of triumph, although you might hear it that way. That's the thing with good music.

A standing ovation erupts and lasts over two minutes, while the composer is hauled up out of the band's baritone section and presented with the score.

What an incredible creation Jack Bewley has given us in *Apokalypsis*. And what a magnificent introduction of his work to the world from Wellington Brass. I hope European brass bands take note of this talented New Zealand composer.

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A Lifetime of Service to Community Music

Kaiaho "Butch" Green, a name synonymous with big band jazz in Christchurch, was recently honoured with the King's Service Medal, a fitting recognition for more than 30 years of musical leadership, mentorship, and community spirit.

Many in the New Zealand brass and jazz community know Butch as the founder and musical director of Sideline Swing. This multigenerational big band has performed at community events, festivals, and swing dances across Christchurch since 1994. However, his influence extends far beyond the stage. Butch's story is one of vision, generosity, and lifelong service — not only to music, but to people.

#### A Band Built on Belonging

Sideline Swing celebrated its 30th anniversary last year, a milestone made possible by Butch's tireless leadership. He has worn every hat imaginable: arranger, conductor, manager, sound technician, and mentor, all as a volunteer. More importantly, he has shaped the band into a welcoming space where musicians of all ages and skill levels can thrive.

In the words of 18-year-old Ryan Scammell, guitarist in Sideline Swing:

"He welcomes, guides and challenges

people with songs they might think are beyond their capabilities... Butch has created an environment where everyone is encouraged to be the best they can be without competition. It's a family."

That sense of family is deeply felt. The band regularly includes teenagers, university students, and musicians well into their 60s and 70s. Several young players Butch has mentored have gone on to professional careers or music study at Berklee College of Music, USA, in London, and top New Zealand institutions. His belief in giving people a go, especially rangatahi, has built both confidence and careers.

#### Champion of the Community

Beyond his work with Sideline Swing, Butch has left his mark on many other corners of the music scene. He was a founding member of the Christchurch Big Band Festival and sat on its committee for over a decade, helping shape it into a cornerstone of the local arts calendar.

He has also been a regular bugler at Anzac Day commemorations. He lends a hand to community brass bands when called upon, including Rangiora RSA Club Brass and Rotorua Brass Band, where he's also played.

Butch's early years in the New Zealand Army Band included creating arrangements that are still used today, a testament to his enduring musical craftsmanship. Today, he continues to write fresh, challenging charts for Sideline Swing, keeping the repertoire alive with a blend of swing, funk, and soul.

#### A Legacy Still Growing

Butch's commitment hasn't wavered in three decades. Judith Bell, Director of the Christchurch Big Band Festival, describes him as "the backbone of a thriving, popular community band" and praises his thoughtful leadership, from setlist planning to choreography and affordability.

One of Butch's most beloved traditions is inviting young jazz players, some as young as 10, to join Sideline Swing for performances. It's more than a thrill; it's a glimpse into a musical future. Many return years later, still playing and still learning, side-by-side with the players who raised them musically.

In recognition of his extraordinary contributions to music and community, Butch Green was awarded the King's Service Medal, a well-deserved honour for a man who has given so much, to so many, for so long.

Dave stood as a testament to the enduring spirit of service and the transformative power of music. For decades, he was a committed brass band player and performer - not always in the spotlight, but always present, always reliable, and always generous with his time, knowledge, and kindness.

Dave has supported generations of players, always patient, with a steady hand and a willingness to go the extra mile. Many of us remember him welcoming us into the band room, often with a soft smile and a kind word, instantly making us feel like we belonged.

Behind the scenes, he worked tirelessly, arranging and sourcing music, cataloguing and sorting with the kind of meticulous care few would ever notice unless it wasn't done. But he never sought recognition. His reward was always in seeing the music played well, and the band thrive.

Dave wrote a lot of music as well; his arrangement of Nearer My God To Thee was an arrangement used often by this band as well as many other bands throughout New Zealand.

Above all, he carried himself with the quiet dignity of a true gentleman. He demonstrated what it meant to lead by example — with humility, with humour, and with heart.

We thank you, Dave, for the years you've given, the wisdom you've shared, and the love you've poured into this band. You were not just a member — you were part of its spirit.

With deep respect and affection, you will be remembered and missed immensely.

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# Big News!

The management committee of BBANZ is pleased to announce the appointment of David Bremner as the musical director of the National Band. This is a role David held from 2020 to 2023, during which the National Band performed joint concerts with the NZSO and the New Zealand Army Band, as well as undertook the first tour to Australia by a National Band.

Since 2006, David has been the musical director of Wellington Brass, leading the band to an historic seven consecutive New Zealand championship titles this year, a total of ten in eleven years, plus a win at the 2015 Australian Band Championships. In 2024, he led Brisbane Excelsior Band to win the Australian championships, following up with a second place this year. In January this year, he conducted the Brighouse and Rastrick Band at the Royal Northern College of Music (RNCM) Brass Festival in Manchester, England.

David is passionate about supporting and developing young musicians, having founded the NZ Brass Foundation, worked with school bands in Tonga, as well as the National Youth Brass Band of Tonga. Closer to home, David has served as the BBANZ Director of Education and Music Director of the National Youth Brass Band from 2015 to 2018.

David has held the Principal Trombone seat of the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra since 2002. He has been a guest principal trombone with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra (London), the Melbourne Symphony, the KBS Symphony (South Korea), the San Francisco Symphony, and the Singapore Symphony.

As a soloist, David has won the New Zealand Champion of Champions and performed solos with the National Band of New Zealand, as well as with bands throughout the UK, Europe, Asia, and Australasia. His 2009 *CD Gung Ho* won the NZ Music Award for Best Classical Album.


## Trans-Tasman Collaboration

Executive Officer of BBANZ Helen Lee said, 'We are delighted to be working with our Australian counterparts to make this happen. Having had Russell as our chief in 2018, we are looking forward to his return.'

Chairperson of the Yamaha Australian National Championships, Annette Ries, also commented that, 'Collaborating with BBANZ to bring Russell Gray to both countries will strengthen the bond between our banding communities and allow for optimum use of Russell's musical expertise.'



## **Banding Together**

I "volunteered" to speak to the Select Committee on behalf of BBANZ and will keep you updated on any developments.

Speaking of great things, later this month, our national secondary schools' training course will get underway. With over 73 players selected for the two bands, it is exciting to see that 30 of these talented young musicians are attending an NSSBB course for the first time. What is also great to see is young players coming from many new or development bands, such as the Addington Workshops Band, New Plymouth JAY band, and Maamaloa Youth Band. This shows that there is excellent teaching, along with administrative support, happening around the country.

If you are in the Wellington region on Saturday, 4 October, please come and listen to these two fine young bands, led by Linda Filimoehala and Nic Scott. I look forward to seeing you there.

More great news in this issue is the announcement of the 2026 National Youth Brass Band. Ten players have been selected for the Youth Band for the first time, once again demonstrating the depth of talent emerging and the excellent teaching taking place. The band will assemble in Auckland in January under the direction of Mark Carter. While Aucklanders are known for not attending events, I hope you will make an effort to come along and hear our talented young musicians.

It's time to start thinking about our Annual Meeting and Workshop Conference. While you may think this sounds like a very dry weekend, it is not. It is an opportunity for bands to set the direction of our movement. Your input is invaluable. It is also an ideal opportunity for conductors, players and administrators to share ideas away from the pressures of a contest.

We are pleased to announce that Jessica Palalagi, General Manager of The Arts Foundation, will be attending and presenting at the workshop. This is not only an excellent opportunity to learn about The Arts Foundation, but also to inform Jessica about all the things brass bands do.

Other workshop sessions planned are on Score Preparation, Music in Schools, Marketing and Social Media, and, by request, something for treasurers. Please join us in Wellington on Saturday, 8 November, for our Annual Conference, some social time on Saturday night, and then the all-important AGM on Sunday, 9 November.

This conference weekend presents an exciting opportunity to engage with a broad cross-section of our members. Remember, this is your organisation, so get involved and help guide us.

Papakura Brass drew a standing-room-only crowd for its mid-winter concert on Sunday, 20 July at the local Off-Broadway Theatre. With more than 100 people in attendance, the concert showcased a 30-piece brass band in full force, joined by award-winning soloist Mike Ford from NBS Nelson City Brass and compered by the popular John McGough.

Led by Musical Director Elliot Gray, the band delivered a crowd-pleasing programme from start to finish. Audience members filled the theatre in Papakura, Auckland, to hear a mix of traditional brass repertoire and well-known toe-tapping tunes.

Headlining the event was celebrated tenor horn soloist Mike Ford. A regular on the contest and concert stage, Mike is one of New Zealand's most accomplished brass musicians. He has won the New Zealand Open Tenor Horn title 16 times, the National Masters title seven times, and placed in the Champion of Champions event 10 times — winning it twice, in 2002 and again in 2024. He is a member of the national champion NBS Nelson City Brass Quartet and a long-time performer with the National Band of New Zealand, where he has served as Solo Horn since 2007.

At the Papakura concert, Mike performed four solo features — Over the Rainbow, Bulgarian Beats, Feelings, and Variations on a Tyrolean Song — showcasing both the skill and experience that have made him a standout performer for nearly five decades.

The concert had something for everyone, featuring classic brass band works like *The Cossack* and *Prelude on Lavenham*, alongside popular pieces including *Hine e* 

Hine, Breezin' Down Broadway, and Sing, Sing, Sing. The night wrapped up on a high with an energetic encore of Pharrell Williams' Happy, earning enthusiastic applause from the crowd.

Compère duties were handled by well-known entertainer and "Trumpet Guy" John McGough, who kept the concert flowing with humour, warmth, and local flair, as well as playing with the band on stage.

Papakura Brass would like to thank all the guest musicians who supported the performance, the Off-Broadway Musical Theatre for hosting the event, and the volunteers who assisted with front-of-house. ## Remembering Dave Marriott. 1958 - 2025

David Ernest Marriott was born on the 19th of September at St George's Hospital in Christchurch. He attended Banks Avenue Primary (where he became the Dux), Heaton Intermediate and then, following in his father's footsteps, Christchurch Boys' High.

In 1974 David (aged 16) joined the Skellerup Woolston Band as a cornet player. His entry in the Junior Cornet Solo that year, *I Dreamt I Dwelt in Marble Halls* (Round), was awarded third place by Kevin Jarrett. At the 1975 contest Dave played Tyler's *Pacific Echoes* for Tom Taylor in the Junior Cornet event and the following 1976 contest marked his first start in the Amateur Cornet event. The Christchurch contest of 1977 opened in the Town Hall Concert Chamber with Bill Stewart judging the Amateur Comet. Dave represented Woolston playing Roy Newsome's *Concorde*.

While a capable and determined soloist, Dave is best remembered as a team player. This is borne out by his membership of a band that, at that time, dominated New Zealand contesting, and also mounted Merv Waters' audacious assault on the British Open in 1975.

In 1980 Dave, now a baritone player, served as Woolston's Assistant Secretary to Murray Scambary and was instrumental in the management of the band's tour to Mt Gambier and Western Australia that year.

During his early years at university Dave

met Robyn Olsen, daughter of the late Herb Olsen (Woolston percussionist alongside Jack Elliot back in the day) and Dave's wife to be.

Dave was an exceptional student. On qualifying, his first job was with Christchurch law firm Western Ward and Lascelles, but in 1983 he moved to Wellington to take a position with Chapman Tripp where he became a partner at just 28 years of age.

At the peak of his legal career Dave and his growing family travelled to various parts of the world. One of these trips included a secondment in Kiribati where David was advising the World Bank - a significant achievement in his career.

Dave had many interests outside of banding, all of which he pursued with characteristic fervour: marital arts (he was a sixth-degree black belt), fishing, running, reading, ballroom dancing, bonsai, hunting, chess and, of course, music.

Once their children left home, Robyn and Dave returned "home" to Christchurch with retirement in mind, but Dave took a position with Lane Neave in the meantime. After the Christchurch earthquake Dave was offered a position in Timaru at Quentin Hix Legal where he managed the practice for three years before being diagnosed with dementia in 2018.

Dave and Robyn returned to Christchurch after his diagnosis to be closer to family.

While the earlier move to Wellington in 1983 brought about the end of Dave's playing days with the Skellerup Woolston Band, he remained interested in, and supportive of, the band serving as an adviser and as a trustee of the Woolston Foundation up to the time of his dementia diagnosis.

Dave live a colourful life, and he is remembered by band-folk, family and colleagues alike as being brilliant, unique, stylish and funny. He passed away on March 24th and is survived by his wife Robyn, three children and five grandchildren.





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### **Next-Gen**

In this issue, Lachlan Spence interviews the 2025 Junior Champion of Champions, Kilian Wei Juan Casey, who plays for Auckland City Brass, the Auckland Youth Orchestra, St Peter's Senior Concert Band and St Peter's Combined Symphony Orchestra.

How did you join a brass band?

At school, I had Josh Rogan as an itinerant teacher, and he invited me to come to this week-long 'camp' he ran for the ACB Youth Band and any other brass kids who wanted to play. I had just started on tuba in 2020 and had braces at the time, so back then it really, really pushed my playing. I remember by the end of the week, my lips were straight-up cut on the inside by my braces, but I improved a huge amount by the end. After that, I played with the ACB Youth Band for four years. Then, in 2023, I played for the senior band's Christmas concert and joined the Senior Band!

Describe how musical ability runs through your family.

My family is quite musical. We don't have any pros in the family, but both my siblings learnt piano from a young age, which made me want to start learning at the age of four, but I started when I was five. On my mum's side, we often sing together, sometimes making up a church service musically run by only our family singing four-part harmonies!

To date, what have been some of your musical highlights?

My biggest highlight would have been my tour with the New Zealand Secondary Students' Choir to China! It was such an eye-opening experience, showing me how diverse the voice can be, given that it's the oldest instrument ever, you'd expect so. Brass-wise, my first national band competition this year with Auckland City Brass in Christchurch would definitely be up there. It's not often you're around so many other brass players, and the most tubas I'd seen in one room before. Also, being part of 'Los Piazollanos', the first brass group in decades to make it to the National Chamber Contest finals, was a huge achievement and having it professionally recorded and posted on YouTube is really cool as well.

What have you gained from being in the Secondary Schools' and National Youth Bands?

I've never been part of one, but I'll be on BBb Bass January 2026 with the National Youth Band!

What sort of things would you like to happen to support young players?

It would be great if there were more opportunities for young players to play together outside of school groups. The brass workshop I had with Josh Rogan honestly changed my life. The push I got when I first started playing tuba was what kick-started



me to want to continue playing and enjoy the process of learning an instrument. Auckland has the KBB Music Festival, which, in a sense, is more of a competition, though honestly, my highlight with it over the six years I've been in it (aside from the awards) was the Honours Band, just an opportunity to play music with people of the same age. It was such a fun experience. I'm sure some players who have never had that kind of opportunity to play in such a strong ensemble would have found it a new experience as well.

Who or what has been your greatest inspiration?

I think my greatest inspiration would be the idea of having the power to resonate with people with my music. To be able to translate what I feel to other people without even needing words, like that's so sick. I know this comes from having your instrument be almost like an extension of your body, which is the level I am striving to achieve. To do this for a living means I'll be able to do this regularly, and it's pretty fun to think that each time I play for someone, I might be able to inspire them to discover how cool this music stuff is as well.

What's the best thing about being in a brass band?

Just the community and the vibes, I think there's something really special about how most of the people play in these bands for free, like it feels really authentic, and the standard is pretty damn high as well.

Is there anyone you would like to thank for helping you with your achievements thus far?

I'd like to thank my teacher Alex Jeantou and previous teacher Lachlan Grant for not only being my instrumental teachers but also inspirations as musicians. And of course I'd like to thank my parents for supporting me, driving me to all my rehearsals and being there to help me take any opportunity that comes my way.

What do you hope to achieve in the future? Playing and work-wise.

If it's financially feasible, next year I'll be moving to Melbourne to study under Tim Buzbee, maybe joining a brass band there. If not, weighing up between Wellington and Auckland. Long term, my goal is to win a job in an orchestra and see what happens from there. Though orchestral playing is my main thing, I love jazz, chamber music, and singing, so I'd want to find a way to keep on going with these, along with brass band. #ACB4LYF

What type of music do you listen to most?

Literally everything, folk, jazz, classical, indie, as long as it's not pop.

Other interests? Checking out new food places and video games

Favourite food? Nasi lemak with beef rendang; it's a Malaysian dish.

Favourite place? My room.

Favourite film? Dune.

Favourite instrument? I kinda have to say tuba, don't I?

Favourite piece of music? COLORATURA by Ichiko Aoba

What do you dislike most? People who touch random keys on a piano while you're playing it.

For the more technical amongst us, what make of instrument do you play? B&S 3098 (PT-6) is my C tuba I got from Texas. Good 'ol Besson Sovereign for my Eb, which I rent from ACB, it's old but does the job.

## 2026 National Youth Brass Band

The BBANZ management committee is delighted to announce that the members of the 2026 National Youth Brass Band have been selected. The names of these talented young musicians are listed below. You will see that the band is a wonderful mix of experienced musicians and new faces, a testament to the growth of the youth music programmes run by our community-based bands. Ten players have been selected for the Youth Band for the first time, including the 2025 Junior Champion of Champions, Kilian Casey from Auckland City Brass. And for what may be the first time, the current Open Champion of Champions winner is a member of a National Youth Band. Congratulations, Keina Rollinson from Woolston Brass.

Joining musical director Mark Carter as the assistant MD is Lachlan Grant. It was only a few years ago that Lachlan was sitting in the band. Lachlan began playing the tuba at the age of 10, in the Waitakere and Auckland City Youth bands. He went on to obtain a Bachelor of Music from the University of Auckland, where he primarily played in orchestral and chamber music contexts. During this period, Lachlan taught as an itinerant music teacher at several high schools. He returned to brass banding with Auckland City Brass in 2019 and went on to join the NZ Army Band. He was selected for the 2022 National Youth Band and the National Band tour of Australia in 2023. Lachlan conducts the New Brighton Silver Band, leading them to win the D Grade at this year's national contest.

The course will be held in Auckland from January 19 to 24, 2026, with two exciting concerts planned. The first event is a lunchtime concert held outside the Ellen Melville Centre in Auckland on Thursday, 22 January. The main event takes place on Saturday, 24 January, at 2:00 pm at Holy Trinity Cathedral, Auckland. The band will perform several pieces, including the *Finale from Symphony No. 3* by Saint-Saens, that showcase the unique sound of a brass band and organ at the cathedral. The band's major works will be *Cloudcatcher Fells* and the jaunty *Tam O'Shanter's Ride*.





logistical and financial undertaking. The management team, Malcom Barr and Hayden Cullen, have worked tirelessly to ensure the event is safe and rewarding for everyone involved. BBANZ is very grateful to the volunteers supporting the management team, musical directors Linda Filimoehala and Nicholas Scott, plus guest soloist Luke Giri-Spence. I am very confident it will be a huge success and a wonderful learning experience for the young musicians attending.

I am looking forward to joining what I am sure will be a large audience to hear the bands perform at their concert at Scots College on Saturday, 4 October.

Funding our representative bands remains a significant challenge. Gaming Trusts

continue to be a primary source of funds for both BBANZ and our member bands, which is why we felt it necessary to actively engage in the review of the Online Casino Gambling Bill introduced by the Government. It was a privilege to present an oral submission on behalf of the brass band community. After hearing numerous other presenters, it became clear that nearly all sporting and arts organisations share our opinion that the Online Casino Gambling Bill should be amended to incorporate the principle from the Gambling Act 2003, ensuring that gambling revenues benefit the community, as is the case with Class 4 operators. Hopefully, the select committee will give clear feedback to the Government along these lines.

BBANZ is YOUR organisation. Despite what many believe, it is not the Management Committee that sets the rules and regulations or the direction of brass banding in New Zealand, but YOU, the players, member bands and District Associations. The annual conference is an ideal opportunity for conductors, players and administrators to share ideas without contesting pressures. Join us in Wellington on Saturday, 8 November, to hear Jessica Palalaqi, General Manager

of The Arts Foundation, and participate in the workshop sessions covering Score Preparation, Music in Schools, Marketing and Social Media and Something for Treasurers. The next day, our AGM is where vital decisions on the future direction of your organisation are made or endorsed by those in attendance. Proposed changes to our Bylaws impact you and your band, so ensure all remits are reviewed in your bandroom and that your band representative is well-prepared to voice your opinion.

It is vital that we have input from as many bands as possible in setting the direction of our movement, so I look forward to catching up with you all next month. And as this year's conference and AGM are in Wellington, it is also an ideal opportunity to review your planning for next year's National Contest, such as checking accommodation and rehearsal venues.

## Introduction

### **Reviewed by David Bremner**

I listened to Kyle Lawson's album *Introduction* straight through—and then immediately played it again. It's that good. The playing is world-class, as we've come to expect from Kyle, but what truly stops you in your tracks is the maturity of his artistry. His technique is flawless, his sound golden, and his range, colour, and stylistic sensitivity are extraordinary. This is an album that everyone should hear, and as a Kiwi brass musician, I couldn't be prouder of the dedication and craft Lawson has poured into sharing this gift with us.

From the opening notes of Bertrand Moren's *Southern Stars*, Lawson sets the tone with breathtaking ease. Moren's brilliant writing shines through, and Lawson's performance feels both effortless and captivating. Pianist Julia Cassels is the perfect partner, providing a wonderfully responsive and supportive accompaniment. Together they create the kind of musical synergy that makes chamber music so rewarding.

Rachmaninoff's *How Fair This Spot* is another highlight, delivered with tenderness and lyrical beauty. Lawson shapes each phrase with elegance, making the music sound deceptively simple when in reality it demands the utmost control and finesse.

Piazzolla's *Oblivion* is intoxicating in Lawson's hands—a sultry, expressive performance that reaffirms why brass players so often turn to Piazzolla for inspiration. For me, it's one of the standout moments of the album.

Perhaps the boldest choice is Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto in D minor. Few cornet players would dare attempt such a work, given its formidable technical and musical challenges. Yet Lawson approaches it with assurance and artistry. While one might miss the raw bite of the violin, his cornet offers a different kind of brilliance—nimble, fluid, and refined. In the finale especially, Lawson's familiarity with the piece is evident; he dances across its hurdles with dazzling ease and infectious joy.

John Golland's *Ballade* and Goff Richards' *Dark Haired Marie* are two brass band staples, the latter an obvious tribute to Kevin Jarrett, who was such an important influence in Lawson's musical journey. Both are played with warmth, fluidity, and heartfelt sincerity.

The penultimate track is Rafael Méndez's stylish and debonair *Chiapanecas*,

before Lawson signs off with Sam Powell's *Milford*. *Milford* is a touching and fitting conclusion, beautifully captured and recorded.

Introduction is more than a debut—it's a statement. Lawson demonstrates not only technical mastery but also a rare ability to communicate deeply and

meaningfully through music. This is an album that rewards repeated listening and firmly establishes him as one of the most

exciting cornetists of his generation.

How 50's Up Brass and Kumeu Vintage Brass are enriching lives in later years. By Ron Vereen.

In two corners of Aotearoa – Christchurch in the South Island and Kumeu in the North – two bands are proving that music really does keep you young. The 50's Up Brass Band in Ōtautahi and the Kumeu Vintage Brass Band just out of Tāmaki Makaurau are made up almost entirely of retirees, bringing joy, purpose, and the thrill of performance to members well into their golden years.

With average ages of about 76 in the 50's Up and 79 in Kumeu Vintage, these ensembles are more than just musical groups. They are vibrant communities dedicated to proving that age is no barrier to passion, creativity, and camaraderie. In doing so, they are also shining examples of the immense benefits the performing arts offer to senior citizens.

50's Up Brass was founded in 1994 to provide a welcoming and encouraging musical home for older players who still wanted to play their horns, but without the pressure of contesting or late-night rehearsals. In fact, the band's constitution prohibits contesting as well as evening rehearsals and performances. Also, the band has no weekend requirements. Any activities outside the norm require a band vote. Rehearsals are held during the day, Wednesdays at 9:30am in the New Brighton Band Room, and performances are geared toward community audiences – retirement villages, public concerts, and civic events.

"At the professional level, it is easy to fall into the trap of thinking of making music as just work," says Alex Morton, Musical Director of 50's Up Brass. "So, I find it very refreshing to work each week with a community ensemble where the people are

there mainly to have a good time, catch up with friends over tea and a bickie, and to make some music in between as well."

In the North Island, Kumeu Vintage Brass shares a similar ethos. Having grown out of the Kumeu Brass Band, the origins of Kumeu Vintage date back to 2005, when some retired members started "having a blow" on Thursday afternoons. These "Old Farts" (as they were known) formed the nucleus of the Kumeu Vintage Brass. Their goal was to carry on with their love of brass banding in a relaxed, friendly setting. In 2008, the Kumeu Vintage Brass started giving public performances. Today, the band has grown into a full ensemble that rehearses weekly, on Thursdays from 10:30am to 12:30pm, and performs regularly around the Auckland area.

Kumeu's solo tenor horn player, Pete Adams, said, "Kumeu Vintage Brass isn't just about music. It's about community. Everyone is warm, friendly, and full of good humour. The halftime tea break is legendary – especially when someone brings a birthday shout!"

### Science Behind the Music

The work these bands are doing is not just about entertainment – it's about health and wellbeing. Research shows that active participation in music can have profound cognitive, emotional, and physical benefits for older adults:

- Cognitive stimulation: Music-making engages memory, attention, and coordination, helping to maintain mental sharpness.
- Emotional wellbeing: Being part of a band offers purpose and connection, reducing loneliness and improving mood.

- Physical health: Playing brass instruments supports lung function, posture, and motor skills.
- Motivation: The excitement of performance activates reward pathways, reinforcing purpose, pride, and long-term engagement

Together, these benefits make community banding a powerful recipe for both wellbeing and joy, turning every rehearsal and performance into an investment in healthier, happier living.

Both Kumeu Vintage and 50's Up Brass are rich with heartwarming stories of rediscovery, resilience, and lifelong friendships. In Kumeu, Brenda shared how she grew up playing trumpet but gave it up after school, when women weren't allowed in her local brass band. Years later, she picked up a cornet, joined Vintage Brass, and hasn't looked back.

Dennis and Norman began their brass journeys together in the Congress Hall Band in the late 1950s. When Norman left banding in the '60s, the two lost touch until 2017, when a friend invited Norman to a Kumeu Vintage rehearsal. To his delight, he found Dennis there still playing after all those years.

The same spirit of connection is true for Rob and brothers Bruce and David, who first played together in the Takapuna Grammar School Cadet Band in the 1950s. Today, all three continue to share the stage in Kumeu Vintage.

In Christchurch, Jane describes herself as a self-taught trombonist. "Though some of the players have been professional musicians in the past, they are tolerant of my amateur efforts," she said. "It is enormous fun and so



satisfying to be making music with such a diverse group of interesting people."

Across both bands, members often speak about the deep support they receive from their fellow players, especially during times of grief or illness. Weekly rehearsals provide not only music but also motivation. As Noelene put it: "Music is a catalyst for getting out of bed in the morning."

Performing for audiences in aged care homes and retirement villages is a highlight for both bands. For many in the audience, the music evokes deep memories and stirs emotions. Without question, playing familiar tunes for these audiences is magical. At every performance, you find the toes tapping and the eyes lighting up, but the music does more than entertain — it

rekindles spirit, connection, and life itself.

As the population of Aotearoa ages, community groups like 50's Up Brass and Kumeu Vintage Brass will become more essential. They stand as joyful reminders that creativity, fellowship, and passion for music don't retire at 65. Community banding is not just about performances. As Alex Morton says, "it's about people surviving, thriving and jiving together well beyond retirement." So, here's to the silver horns – and the silver-haired musicians who continue to bring them to life. Long may they continue to "thrive and jive."

### Want to join?

Both bands welcome new members. No audition is necessary, just a love of music and a willingness to give it a go. Whether

you're a former contest player or someone who's just rediscovered an old horn in the attic, these groups offer the perfect place to reconnect with music. "Someone once asked: How long can you play a brass instrument? The answer was — for as long as you want to practise; age isn't a barrier to our playing!" said John Knowles, Music Director of Kumeu Vintage.



# Central Districts Contest

Eight bands competed in the Central Districts Band Contest held at the Speirs Centre in Palmerston North over the weekend of the 6 and 7 September.

On Saturday, the bands presented their Reflective Item and Major Work. Brass Whanganui won both events in the first section, as did Palmerston North Brass in the second section. Palmerston's performance of their Reflective Item achieved a second place across all grades. The New Plymouth JAY Band won the third section.

In the Concert Programme on Sunday, Brass Whanganui and their featured soloist Hamish Jellyman were clear winners in the first section. It was a very close affair in the second section, with Palmerston North and Feilding Brass sharing both the Concert Programme and solo events, which featured Elizabeth Rane from Feilding and Russell Schwarfeger from Palmerston North. Hawera Brass claimed the March at the Halt award held outside, and all three bands shared the Stage Presentation award.

Section three was another tight tussle with Brass Whanganui Concert Brass winning the Concert Programme, Solo Item (Moata Leiva-Benegas), and Stage Presentation.

The contest highlighted the strength of youth bands in the district, with Palmerston North Academy making its first contest appearance in Section Three, and Hawera Brass featuring a strong contingent of young musicians.


Celine Wu won first prize in the Soloist category with her performance of *Concerto d'Aranjuez* with North Shore Brass Academy.



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# 2025 National Secondary Schools' Bands

The National Secondary Schools' Brass Band and Development Band, made up of 68 young musicians from Auckland to Invercargill, represented 38 different schools, including Homeschool students.

The students assembled at lunchtime on Tuesday, 30 September, at Scots College in Wellington and immediately got to work rehearsing as a combined band under Musical Directors Linda Filimoehala (National Secondary Schools' Brass Band) and Nic Scott (National Secondary Schools' Development Band). This was followed by each band rehearsing on its own before being taken to the boarding rooms and settling into their new home for the next five days.

After dinner and some more rehearsals, it was game time to get to know each other. The students enjoyed a variety of activities, including Human Bingo, Would I Lie To You, Balloon Races, and Balloon Juggling. It was a joy to see the students making new friends and catching up with friends made in previous years.

Wednesday saw a huge day of rehearsals with over six hours of playing including rehearsals with guest soloist Luke Giri-Spence (Royal New Zealand Navy Band) and sectionals with the amazing tutors: Nicholas Garrett (Solo Cornets/Soprano); Liam Wright (Back Row Cornets); Ray Farrow (Tenor Horns/Flugel); Luke Giri-Spence (Euphoniums/Baritones); Leo Read

(Trombones); Jordan Seaton (Basses); Jeremy Richardson, Riwai Hina, Grant Myhill (Percussion). The students put in a massive effort from start to finish, and you could really hear the progress they were making.

On Wednesday evening, we welcomed guest speaker Mark Carter. Mark is the Musical Director of the National Youth Band and Sub-Principal Trumpet with the NZSO. He told us stories of his musical journey from starting as a young player in brass bands in the UK to a life as a professional musician. His stories about some of the people he has met and performed with, including Wynton Marsalis and Pavarotti, were incredible. Then he told us some details about sitting on an audition panel for top orchestras and what he listens for in audition performances, which the students found very interesting and useful, before taking 15 minutes for questions.

Thursday saw another six hours of rehearsal, as well as time to get into groups for the evening Ensemble Competition. Each ensemble had 8-12 students, and they could choose their own music from a selection of about 20 tunes. Students were encouraged to have fun, and they didn't necessarily have to play their own instruments. The competition in the evening was a highlight of the week, with lots of laughs and some "creative" interpretations of the music, judged by the Boarding House Matron. The tutors and course staff also performed a medley, culminating in a moving

performance of Moana with Linda singing.

Friday morning, there was time for a short rehearsal before handing out the official t-shirts and taking band photos before piling onto a bus and heading to the Wellington Waterfront. It was great to have a large crowd for our 20-minute taster concert by the combined bands in the sun. (Phew! There had been some cold wind and rain on Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday.) Students then had nearly two hours to explore Wellington, visiting some of the attractions, including Parliament and Te Papa, while others focused on the fashion shops!

Saturday was the big day with the concert in the afternoon. We had a large audience in attendance, and the livestream has had over 900 views. It was a fantastic concert that showcased the exceptional talent of these young stars in the making. Luke Giri-Spence was inspirational with his virtuoso solo playing, performing solos with both bands. We were treated to 40 minutes from each band and 20 minutes from the combined bands.



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### **NZ Test Works**

BBANZ was delighted to receive almost 40 submissions to be considered for the test selections for the 2026 National Brass Band Championships. These were evenly distributed across the four grades, which was also pleasing.

Entries opened on the 25th of February, and composers had until the 31st of July to submit their works for consideration.

The music was anonymously assessed by three leading figures in the brass band world, who provided feedback on each piece before indicating which works they thought should be shortlisted for selection. Our international panel of experts was pleased to see such a high level of work being submitted, and they spent quite some time studying and assessing the works before creating their shortlist. Our incoming adjudicators then made their final selections from this list.

Panel chair **Professor Philip Wilby** expressed his enthusiasm, stating that it was "indeed very encouraging to see so much creativity and expertise on show for the future of brass banding in New Zealand". He described the works as "fascinating and varied". **Dr Tom Davoren** praised the "strong music in the field", and **Dr Liz Lane** also shared her enjoyment of reading the scores and getting to know the music of our composers.

Here are the programme notes from the composers, and a few highlights from the panel's comments about each of the selected works:

A Grade: Taniwha (Scott Kennedy-French)



In Māori mythology, taniwha are powerful, semi-aquatic, supernatural creatures that inhabit dangerous waterways, ranging from rivers and deep pools in caves to the

seacoast. They are mainly to be found in places with perilous or deceptive currents or waves. In some instances, they act as fierce guardians of places, tribes, or individuals, sometimes as notorious punishers of taboobreakers, and sometimes as predatory monsters who eat men and abduct women.


A sinfonia selvaggia (wild symphony) for brass band. In three movements, played as a single sequence. The fast outer movements share elements, such as tempo and core thematic material, that unify the work, much like a rondo form (A-B-A). At the same time, each also contains and develops individual materials and character. These turbulent outer movements are contrasted with a slow, atmospheric, and lyrical inner movement that features extended rising solo voices and culminates in a rich, chorale-like conclusion.

**PW**: This score has many excellent qualities, being aurally fresh and harmonically inventive.

**LL:** Exciting. Nice shapes through the band. Lots of rhythmic vitality in percussion. Vibrant last movement with plenty of intricacy. A long, dynamic build-up to the unexpected end – skillfully done!

**TD:** More abstract than your typical brass band test piece. Motivic development is strong but non-traditional. Very strong piece.

B Grade: Images (David Woodcock)



The title *Images* reflects the work's unfolding narrative: a sequence of contrasting musical episodes that evolve from a central motif. Though varied in character, each section is connected by a thread of thematic continuity, creating a vivid tapestry of sonic impressions.

The piece is driven by the rising and falling motion of the initial motif and its associated

upbeat. A strident, forceful opening is soon replaced by a period of calmness and serenity, abruptly disturbed by the timpani and low brass, ushering in a dark, menacing atmosphere that gives way to a mysterious and shadowy episode. A fanfarelike moment emerges, which evolves into a winter landscape. The original motif reappears in a fragmented form, with the menacing theme never far away, blending earlier elements into a turbulent and chaotic milieu. From this disorder springs a playful, even banal interlude, which morphs into a restless, nervous passage that assumes a demonic, dark character. A canonic section built over bare fifths evokes echoes of earlier music, only to be interrupted by a strident, sarcastic outburst. This is followed by a lighter moment, reminiscent of the earlier playful section, but which soon turns more sinister.

As the work draws to a close, the music becomes reflective and wistful, then brooding, before shifting into a brighter, more lighthearted mood, and ultimately to a majestic and climactic conclusion —a powerful resolution to this journey through sound and emotion.

**PW:** Immediately arresting. Pure musical shapes are attractive, with an interplay between solo material and massed sounds. This is an excellent submission, ideally designed for B Grade bands.

**LL:** Lots of dramatic contrast. Effective moments including texture, angularity and unexpected chords. Sophisticated approach to band writing.

**TD:** Very strong piece. Engaging motifs are developed well. Great contrasts in style in sections, but still holding continuity with the rest of the piece.

**C Grade:** Where the Light Falters (Kodi Rasmussen)



Unfolding across four interconnected sections, Where the Light Falters explores the tension between regimental drive, darkness, and fleeting glimpses of light. The piece opens with distant, precise snare drum semiguavers and a dark bass motif, which swell into a commanding brass fanfare. This triumph quickly unravels into a cynical, dance-like episode—a jester's tune weaving through moments of lyrical warmth in the horns. The dance transforms briefly into harmony and light, though its joy remains fragile. A reflective third section follows, almost sacred in tone. A cornet cadenza laments before a trombone's fierce reply, leading to a chorale-like passage driven by the euphoniums. Earlier themes re-emerge, now softened and luminous, building toward a hopeful, prayer-like climax. The finale unites all past material—the cynical dance, brooding motifs, and triumphant fanfare into a dramatic conclusion. Yet its closing twist, a sudden plunge back into darkness, leaves one question lingering: have we conquered the shadows, or merely learned to live with them?

**PW:** This is an outstanding composition. It is perfectly designed for its purpose, fitting the best Section C bands perfectly. Equally, it will bring out the very best performances from its executants and be totally involving for the audiences. It has a variety of texture, with clean tuttis contrasting with eloquent solos and precious moments of chamber music. If its final pages were to be longer, I would not complain, and best of all, it is a complete experience, allowing the composer to make a perfectly judged personal statement. In short, it has everything that could be asked of a lower section score. Bravo!

LL: Interesting build-up at the beginning

to full band. Good use of texture and developing motifs. Nice reference later on to earlier material. Would be engaging to play.

**TD:** A good piece. Well-paced, the motivic material is convincing and develops well. The music has good clarity and is well organised. With solos and section ensemble sections, it should prove an effective test.

**D Grade:** *Elegy for Brass Band* (Fraser Bremner)

The composer, Fraser Bremner, wrote this work based on his own experiences with personal loss and his focus on the light at the end of the tunnel. In the Oxford Dictionary, the word *Elegy* is described as a poem of serious reflection and, sometimes, a lament for the dead. Although this piece of music isn't so much about the loss of life, it is focused on the loss of things that are meaningful to a person. The composer's focus for this work was on moments in his life when he struggled due to loss and how he managed to find positivity in these challenging situations.

Elegy was written for the Eastern Bay of Plenty Brass and their Musical Director, Andrew Leech, and dedicated to both Andrew & Bronwynne Leech for their years of continued friendship and love.

**PW:** This short score has much to commend. It shows natural invention and variety. This piece will be welcomed by performers, listeners and adjudicators alike.

**LL:** Engages the listener from the outset. Lovely use of lyricism. Nice how the return of the original theme at Fig. F is different. Lovely ending.

**TD:** Well-considered use of doubling. Full band scoring has clarity and consistency.

The phrasing/articulation is detailed, but not overmarked.

The call for scores extended to solo works for the Open Brass sections. Again, we were delighted by the number and quality of works received. As you will see from the list below, the majority of pieces are by New Zealand composers. For information on where to purchase the pieces, use this link

### **Next-Gen**

In this issue, Lachlan Spence interviews 18-year-old Aran Quaggin-Molloy, who plays for Hutt City Brass, Wellington Youth Orchestra, and the school orchestra, choir, jazz combo, and rock band at Scots College, Wellington. Aran has recently been selected for the National Youth Band for the first time.

What was your first musical experience?

My first musical experience I remember is seeing my mum play trumpet in a Big Band, and I was always fascinated by what the drummer was doing. So, I asked my mum for drum lessons at the age of 7, and soon after, I joined Buzzing Brass. From there, I branched out from drums to percussion. After my first NSSBB course in 2022, I wanted to push myself and joined Hutt City Brass. The rest is history;)

Describe how musical ability runs through your family.

My great-grandfather played the cornet in a brass band in the UK, and that's how my mum started learning cornet. My mum and I both now play in Hutt City Brass, and I'm sure it's the highlight of her week. Unfortunately, my dad is completely tone deaf and can't even sing in tune.

To date, what have been some of your musical highlights?

Some of my highlights include the first time I played timps on stage in *Dances and Alleluias* for Hutt City Brass at the nationals in 2023. I was also honoured to be able to play the bass drum part for *Tchaikovsky 4* with the NZSO at the Young Artists Showcase. A recent highlight would be playing *Lady Macbeth* with Orchestra Wellington at their most recent concert.

What have you gained from being in the Secondary Schools' Brass Band?

I think the secondary schools' courses have been a real highlight for me, as playing with so many other amazingly talented musicians my age has been so humbling and has also allowed me to make lots of lifelong connections with people. I then love being able to catch up with all these people at Nationals.

What sort of things would you like to see happen to support young players?

The NSSBB is a great opportunity for young players, and I'd strongly recommend it to anyone for many reasons.

Who or what has been your greatest inspiration?

I've met many great players along the way who've influenced me to try different styles, new groups, and to perform on stage to develop my confidence.

What's the best thing about being in a brass



band?

The whole reason I will always prefer playing percussion in a brass band over an orchestra is the amount of experience you get. The sheer amount of percussion playing compared with orchestral playing is what makes it for me. I like to be able to play without having to count hundreds of bars rest and be able to play as loud as I want!

Is there anyone you would like to thank for helping you with your achievements thus far?

I'd like to thank my teacher, Thomas, who's always pushed me to be better and better every week, and my parents for driving me around to every rehearsal and concert and putting up with loud percussion in the house.

What do you hope to achieve in the future?

I aim to begin studying music at Te Kōkī NZSM next year, but I still haven't decided if it's jazz or classical performance. But either way, I'll always continue with brass banding. Quickfire questions



# **World-class Williamses**

BBANZ is delighted to announce that Glyn and Helen Williams will be joining Russell Gray as adjudicators for the 2026 National Championships. This is not the first time New Zealand has hosted a married couple in the judges' tent. In 2019, at the Blenheim contest, Russell was joined by his wife Mareika Gray.

Glyn Williams was born in Aberystwyth, Wales, where he was introduced to music by his uncle and enjoyed playing euphonium with Towyn Silver Royal Oakley and Menai Bridge, all local bands.

Glyn was appointed as solo euphonium with the Foden's Band in 1995, contributing to many contest victories, including the Swiss Open, All England Masters, French Open, Brass in Concert, North West Area Finals more than 10 times, the titles of National and British Open Brass Band Champions of Great Britain, English National Champions and All England International Masters Champions. 2012 was the pinnacle of this contesting success, when Foden's won both the Open and National Championships.

Glyn has been awarded individual awards at all the major contests, including a 'Double' in 2008 when he was awarded the best instrument prize at both the British Open and National Brass Band Championships. He has been awarded the best Euphonium prize on no fewer than nine occasions at the Brass In Concert Championships.

After 20 consecutive years of service at Foden's Band, Glyn made the decision to move to South Wales and to join the Cory Band in the summer of 2015, beginning a whole new chapter in his brass banding

career. Since then, Glyn has been pivotal in helping Cory to make history in an unprecedented Grand Slam year of 2016, when the Band won the European, British Open, National and Brass in Concert titles. In 2019, Glyn was part of the Cory Band, which again achieved the Grand Slam and added the Brass Pass UK Band of the Year title to their accolades. In 2017, Glyn was awarded Best Instrumentalist at the European Championships, and more recently, he was awarded Best Instrumentalist at the Welsh Regional Championships in 2022 and 2024.

In January 2025, Glyn celebrated 30 years as Principal Euphonium player with both Foden's and Cory, an achievement he is very proud of.

Helen Williams began playing the cornet at the age of ten, encouraged by her father, who played cornet with Poynton Band, where she also played for 10 years.

She joined The Marple Band in 1986 as Principal Cornet, performing with the band in many concerts and contest successes, culminating in Helen becoming the first female Principal Cornet to win the 1996 British Open Brass Band Championship. She was also awarded the Stanley Wainwright Memorial Trophy as the day's best soloist.

In December 1999, Helen was appointed as Flugel Horn Soloist with Foden's Band, where she remained for just over 15 years, enjoying many contest and concert performances. Contest successes with Foden's were many, including six successive years as North West Regional Champions, English Nationals Champions, All England Masters Champions, US Open Champions, three British Open wins

and of course the historic "double" when the band also won the National Championships in October 2012.

The Summer of 2015 saw Helen invited to take up the Flugel seat at the Cory Band, subsequently becoming part of the unprecedented Grand Slam band, which won the European, British Open, National and Brass in Concert titles in 2016. She was also awarded the Best Instrumentalist Prize at the Open and the Nationals, Best Flugel Horn at Brass in Concert, and earned the accolade of Player of the Year from her peers at Cory. Topping off an incredible year of personal achievements, Helen was also named Player of the Year by 4barsrest.com.

Of course, history does have a way of repeating itself, and in 2019 Cory again achieved the Grand Slam, this time also adding the title of Brass Pass UK Band of the Year to their crown. Her ten years at Cory have coincided with the most successful time in the band's history, accruing three British Open, three National, three European and five Brass in Concert titles to her tally.

Helen works as Deputy Registrar at the Brass Band Players' Registry, which covers all competing English and Welsh bands. She is proud to be a regular tutor at the National Youth Brass Band of Great Britain and the National Youth Brass Band of Wales, and to have also taught at the National Youth Brass Band of Scotland and the National Youth Brass Band of Switzerland (where she was guest soloist in 2019).

Helen is proud to be an Adams Artist and an endorsee of Denis Wick Products.



# **News from Motueka District Brass Band**

At the recently held Annual General Meeting of Motueka District Brass, two members were awarded Life Membership.

Paul Hawkes and Vanessa Harris were both awarded this honour for their dedication and continued work with the band. Brass Band Association Long Service Awards were awarded to both of them, as well as to Colin Hope and Shanon Kissell, whilst the band's own award for the Most Improved Junior Player was presented to Bella Kissell.

**Paul Hawkes:** 56-year Long Service award and Life Member

Paul started his banding career in 1969 in the Cornet section, until eventually he transferred to Eb Bass. In 1995, he "took the mace" as Drum Major, which he still carries. When not drum majoring, he plays Eb Bass

in the band.

**Vanessa Harris:** 40-year Long Service award and Life Member

Vanessa started in the Takaka Band on trombone in 1985. She remained with Takaka until she moved out of the area to attend Polytech in Nelson in 1992, at which stage she transferred to Motueka, remaining attached to her trombone. During her time with Motueka, she has fulfilled many roles, with her tenure as Librarian being her most significant.

Colin Hope: 30-year Long Service award

Colin's introduction to the banding world was via his son at the 1995 AGM, where he was elected to the committee as 'parent representative' and Drill Instructor. Since then, he has been integrated into the

band as a Percussionist, primarily as a Bass Drummer, with a smattering of other percussion instruments, whilst continuing as a committee member.

**Shanon Kissell:** 26-year Long Service. His banding life started with Marlborough District Brass in 1998 on the cornet before switching to Eb Bass. In 2009, he transferred to Nelson, where he remained until moving to Motueka in 2020. Whilst with Nelson, he played Euphonium, BBb Bass, and finally Eb Bass, which he still plays with us here in Motueka.

**Bella Kissell** received the Horace Boyes Baton for most improved Junior Player. Fourteen-year-old Bella joined the band earlier this year, playing baritone and is growing in confidence every week.



# A Tri-Region Triumph

From 17–19 October, the Nelson Marlborough West Coast Brass Band Association held its annual Youth Band Camp—an inspirational weekend that brought together the region's young brass and percussion players for three days of music, learning, and fabulous fun!

This year's camp, held at the Sport and Recreation Centre in Murchison, welcomed 30 enthusiastic students. Participants ranged from absolute beginners who had been learning for just four months to seasoned young musicians with 10 years of experience. They travelled from Greymouth, Westport, Lake Rotoiti, Nelson, and Marlborough, representing the full spread of the association's diverse and vibrant brass banding community.

Ages ranged from our youngest player at 8 to the eldest at 19, creating a dynamic environment where new learners were inspired by older role models, and experienced musicians enjoyed the chance to mentor and support their younger peers.

The band was expertly led by Musical Director Elliot Gray, whose energy and rapport with the students proved exceptional. Elliot's rehearsals were fun, focused, and motivating—quickly

transforming a group of mixed experience levels into a cohesive ensemble brimming with confidence.

Supporting Elliot was a talented team of tutors, Ross Gerritson and Sophie Ward-Murray from Nelson and Nathan Keoghan and Dylan Taylor from Westport. Together, they provided sectional coaching, encouragement, and musical guidance that helped each student—no matter their level—make real progress over the weekend.

No camp runs smoothly without good food, and this year's catering duo, "Granny & Annie", were nothing short of legendary. They kept hungry teenagers (and tutors!) fuelled with warm, hearty meals and plenty of home-style comfort. Their efforts were appreciated by all and became a talking point almost as popular as the music itself.

The camp concluded with a Sunday afternoon concert, proudly performed for an audience of 45 Murchison locals. The programme included a special highlight: Spencer Keoghan from Westport performed a euphonium solo with the band, impressing the audience with his confidence and musicianship. What began as a polite crowd soon warmed into enthusiastic supporters—

with calls for "more music!" Unfortunately, the entire repertoire had already been performed, so a repeat of the last item was called for. This was flattering proof of how impressively the band had come together in just three days!

Perhaps the greatest endorsement came from the students themselves. Even the youngest and most junior participants were asking if they could "do band camp again next weekend."

With another successful camp now behind us, and many students already counting down, plans are already stirring for next year.



# **Tom Hutchinson in Nelson**

Nelson played host to an unforgettable weekend of brass music as internationally acclaimed cornet virtuoso Tom Hutchinson brought his talent and expertise to the region. Hutchinson adjudicated the New Zealand Young Brass Musician of the Year competition, offering invaluable insights to the country's rising stars through lessons and workshops. The weekend culminated in a spectacular concert, An Evening with Tom Hutchinson, where he joined NBS Nelson City Brass at the iconic Nelson Cathedral to celebrate the rich tradition of brass music in the region.

Nine young musicians from around the country gathered in Nelson for the Young Brass Musician of the Year competition. Each finalist was required to perform two contrasting pieces: a slow melody and a technical work. The slow melody allowed competitors to demonstrate musicality, tone quality, and expressive phrasing, while the technical piece tested precision, agility, and control. This dual format allowed Hutchinson to hear over 15 minutes from each player over the afternoon. Thank you to Brendan Agnew and Zeb Wulff, who accompanied the soloists.

The finalists were Jonty Zydenbos - Soprano Cornet; Celine Wu - Cornet; Luca Cable - Cornet; Monika Duncan - Cornet; Emily Sullivan - Flugel Horn; Amy Laithwaite - Trombone; Walter Hughes - Euphonium; and Logan Ready - Trombone.

First place was awarded to Mia Yee from Addington Brass, with Jonty Zydenbos (Hutt City Brass) second, and Logan Ready (Marlborough District Brass) third.

The highlight of Tom's weekend with the band was undoubtedly his feature concert in the Nelson Cathedral. His command of the cornet is well-known and unquestioned, but to hear it in person was breathtaking. His mastery of the technical aspects of playing, combined with exquisite control and sound, really makes him a complete package. The standing ovation at the end of the concert was a fitting tribute and recognition of his excellent performance.

Tom performed *The Paragon* by E. Sutton; *Don't Doubt Him Now* by L. Ballantine, *Tico Tico* arr. J. Iveson, *Fuego!* by P. Harper and *Mr Bojangles* arr. D Griffiths.

The final part of the weekend was a workshop run by Tom in the theatre at Nayland College. The focus of the session was exploring daily practise routines and the need to be consistent in what and how we practise, with the underlying message being that if we don't put time into maintaining control of our sound, flexibility and technique, we can't expect those things to be ready when we call on them!

Reflecting on the week, Tom said, "It's been an incredible week in New Zealand with Nelson City Brass. The band were such fantastic hosts and have some extremely talented players around the stand. They recognise the importance of developing youth not only within the band, but across the country, attracting players from all over to compete in the New Zealand Young Brass Musician final, hosted by the band. The competition was a huge success, and it will no doubt attract more young musicians, given the high standard of the participants. A special thanks must also go to Sheena Whitehouse, Nigel Weeks and Ross Gerritsen for their hospitality, friendship and the invitation to visit the band this past week. It's been amazing!"



# **Next-Gen**

In this issue, Lachlan Spence catches up with Kodi Rasmussen, who was interviewed back in 2018. Back then, Kodi was playing with Marlbough District Brass and the National Youth Band and was about to start studying trumpet at the New Zealand School of Music in Wellington the following year. And now, 25-year-old Kodi has had a composition selected as a test piece for the 2026 national contest.

What are you doing now?

Right now, I'm based in Wellington, working full-time as a composer while balancing a range of contract projects on the side. Living here has been great for my creativity, as it keeps me close to the ensembles, collaborators, and performance groups I work with. Alongside my full-time role as Resident Composer and Repertoire Co-Ordinator for the Wellington Chapel, I'm writing music for a variety of commissions, currently including concert works and a musical, and I'm also developing my composition portfolio. I also play with Wellington Brass, which keeps me connected to performing and the banding community. So at the moment it's a mix of steady writing, contract composing and arranging projects, performing with Wellington Brass, and ongoing creative work.

What have been some of your musical highlights?

Some of my biggest musical highlights include having my work performed by groups like the NZSO, NZ String Quartet, and Wellington Brass, and winning the Orchestra's Choice Award at the NZSO Todd Young Composer's Competition. Writing music for shows like 'Too Bald Clowns' and 'Delightfool' has also been a standout, along with returning to Marlborough Civic Orchestra with my recent piece Tenfold. Working with young musicians and my time teaching and directing music projects in Cambodia were also really meaningful experiences. Overall, the highlights are the moments where musical collaboration and community come together.

What positive impacts has brass banding had on your musical success?

Brass banding has honestly been one of the biggest influences on my musical journey. Playing in bands has kept me sharp as a performer, but it's also shaped the way I write music. You learn so much just by sitting in the middle of that sound: how parts fit together, how to listen properly, and how to work as a team. It's also opened a lot of doors for me. I've met great players, worked with notable conductors, and taken on projects I wouldn't have had access to otherwise. Plus, teaching and helping out younger musicians through banding has made me a better communicator. Overall,





brass banding has kept me inspired, connected, and constantly learning, and that's had a huge impact on where I am today.

What would you say to young brass musicians who'd like to explore composition?

I'd say absolutely go for it. The great thing about being a brass player is that you already understand how instruments breathe, phrase, blend, and balance, and that's a massive head start in composition. Start small: write for the people around you, your band, your section, or even just yourself. Hearing your music played live is the best teacher you'll ever have. Don't worry about making something "perfect." Just experiment, try ideas, and learn as you go. Ask players and conductors for feedback. Brass band musicians are usually more than happy to help. And listen widely, not just to brass music but to orchestral, film, contemporary, whatever inspires you. Most importantly, enjoy the process. Composition is just another way of expressing your musicianship, and the sooner you start exploring it, the faster your voice will grow!

Tell us about composing "Where the Light Falters"

Where the Light Falters is my first composed test piece, which an international panel has selected as the C Grade set test piece for the 2026 New Zealand Brass Band Championships. This was a personal piece to write. It explores that feeling of moving through uncertainty, the moments where things feel dim, heavy, or unclear, but you keep pushing forward anyway. Musically, I wanted to capture the quiet tension of

those darker moments, while still letting a sense of hope break through. The piece moves between fragile, reflective textures and more powerful, expansive sections. That contrast represents those shifts we experience when we're navigating difficult periods: the dips, the hesitation, and then the sudden clarity or resolve. It's also a piece that gave me the chance to lean into my orchestral style, with long lines, rich harmony, and a focus on atmosphere. Hearing bands bring it to life, especially the way they shape the slow, expressive sections, will be one of the most rewarding parts of the process. Overall, Where the Light Falters is about finding brightness in places where things feel uncertain and trusting that the light will return, even if it takes time.

Is there anyone you would like to thank for helping you with your achievements thus far?

Absolutely, I've been really lucky to have a lot of support along the way. First and foremost, I'm grateful to the teachers and mentors who've guided me, especially during my studies. They helped shape my musical voice and pushed me to grow both creatively and professionally. I also owe a huge thanks to the ensembles and musicians who have trusted me with their time and talent, from brass bands to orchestras and chamber groups. Having people believe in your music and bring it to life is something I never take for granted. My colleagues, collaborators, and the people I work with in Wellington have also played a big part in my journey. Their encouragement, feedback, and friendship have made the process so much more rewarding. And

finally, my friends and family, their support behind the scenes has been massive. They've been there through every late night, deadline, and new opportunity. Overall, I wouldn't be where I am without the community around me, and I'm really grateful for all of them.

What do you hope to achieve in the future?

Looking ahead, I want to keep growing as a composer while taking on projects that push me creatively. I'd love to write more large-scale works, both for brass band and for orchestra, and continue building a portfolio that reflects my voice across different styles. I'm also aiming to expand my work in media composition, whether that's for TV, theatre, or other collaborative projects. I really enjoy storytelling through music, so developing more long-term creative partnerships is a big goal. Another focus is helping strengthen the brass band community through arranging, mentoring younger musicians, and contributing new works to the repertoire. And with my partner and I planning to move to Europe next year, I'm excited to connect with new ensembles, new creative circles, and new opportunities over there. Overall, I hope to keep creating meaningful music, continue collaborating with great people, and find ways for my work to resonate with performers and audiences alike.

What type of music do you listen to most? (2018) Honestly, whatever is playing on the radio. But I'd prefer to listen to orchestral, big band and brass band works.

(Now) Surf, Indy and rock/pop.

Other interests? (2018) Composing/arranging music. Acting/performing. Video games. Being with my friends and family. (Now) Being outside and active with friends.

Favourite food? (2018) Sushi. (Now) Apple cinnamon crumble with vanilla ice cream!

Favourite place? (2018) My bedroom. (Now) The Wellington outdoors.

Favourite film? (2018) I don't really have one. I'd watch anything if it's not a horror film.

(now) Hundreds of Beavers.

Favourite instrument? (2018) To play, trumpet. My favourite in general: Clarinet, French Horn or Marimba. (Now) Piano.

Favourite piece of music? (2018) Mahler's 5th Symphony. (Now) I'm listening to a lot of Ravel.

What do you dislike most? (2018) Nothing. (Now) Probably when Sibelius decides to crash, exactly when I'm feeling inspired. Truly character-building stuff.

For the more technical amongst us, what make of instrument do you play?

(2018) Yamaha Xeno Trumpet with a 16C4 mouthpiece.

JP Cornet with a 4 mouthpiece.

Finally, an Eastman Flugelhorn with a 4FL mouthpiece.

# Conference and AGM Summary

Now in its fourth year, the conference workshops are proving to be a useful event alongside our AGM weekend. This year, we started with a presentation from David Bremner, aimed primarily at musical directors, but its content was very interesting to band managers and members alike. David shared his philosophy on building a band both musically and culturally, setting realistic goals and how he prepares his players for performances.

In the first of the split workshop sessions, Vickie van Uden detailed how Woolston Brass runs its Wider Opportunity instrumental music programme in primary schools. Vickie is the driver of this programme, which has enabled over 800 young students to play a brass instrument. In the other room, Carolyn Cordery, Adjunct Professor at Victoria University's School of Accounting and Commercial Law, gave an informative presentation on what the annual accounts say about an organisation, protecting your assets, especially from fraud, budgets and opportunities to maximise revenue.

The group came together again to hear from Jessica Palalagi, the General Manager of The Arts Foundation. Some quick facts from Jessica's presentation include that 117,912 people are employed in the arts in NZ and that in 2024 the arts contributed \$17.5 billion to GDP. However, 50% of New Zealanders don't think the arts are for them because they're not creative enough, academic enough, wealthy enough or the arts are seen as intimidating. The Arts Foundation aims to break down barriers so more people can engage in the arts and creativity, and to rally funders to support this. The Arts Foundation runs the Boosted crowdfunding website, which is for arts projects only.

Back to split workshop sessions, where Cameron Burnett from the NZ Army Band gave a very practical presentation on how to use social media to tell your story and boost engagement, which had most people in the room changing their phone settings, ready to take their first reel to post. Next door, BBANZ Board member Leigh Martin outlined how the Association has been helping individual bands with their training and development needs. Whether this is through arranging a mentor, a workshop leader or some funding, the programme has supported 18 different events in the last year. The biggest takeaway from the session is that Leigh can also arrange support for your band.

Most of the workshops were live-streamed and can still be watched on the BBANZ Facebook page <a href="https://www.facebook.com/brassbanz/">https://www.facebook.com/brassbanz/</a> - 4.5K have already viewed David Bremner's presentation.

Those who attended the sessions agreed it was a valuable opportunity to gain information and ask questions. But best of all was the opportunity to share ideas and chat with people in similar situations.

Quick notes from the AGM meeting:

This was the first year that delegates could attend the meeting online with the ability to vote and speak.

The 2027 National Contest in Invercargill will now be held from Wednesday, 14 to Saturday, 17 April. The reason for the change is to enable the National Youth Brass Band to be part of a youth festival sponsored by the NZSO featuring the NYBB alongside the National Youth Orchestra and National Youth Choir.

The location for the 2028 contest has yet to be decided because no applications were received by the original closing date. Following the extension of the closing date and opening of the location up to all of New Zealand, three expressions of interest were received. The Board will now engage with the applicants and will announce the location early next year.

In a break from tradition, the discussion on the Remits was uneventful and over rather quickly, with the only changes to the Contest Bylaws being that soloists at the national contest, other than in the Masters and Slow Melody events, can only play in one section. This change is a return to the status quo from 2020. Delegates did not support changing the performance of the Sacred Item to the Saturday nor the introduction of an Open Own Choice solo.

The 2026 Conference and AGM will be held in Christchurch on Saturday, 7 and Sunday, 8 November.
